Permit me to expound a bit on the spectacular parks of Grosse Pointe Woods!

Floral bouquets cascading from colonial lampposts on tree-lined boulevards. Grassy plazas surrounding arbors of snowdrift crabapples and dotted with dogwoods. Pollinator plants beckoning birds, bees, and butterflies to gardens of native purple coneflowers and yellow hyssop. Nature is thriving in picturesque Grosse Pointe Woods and inviting all to experience it while enjoying our fabulous community.

The newly renovated **Chene Trombley Park** – featuring the all-new **Phyllis A. DeMars Tot Lot and Swing Area** – draws young families with children to its accessible-to-all play equipment and walking path. Visitors breeze through a modern sail shade entrance into a world of toddler-friendly amenities like the Friendship Swing, We-Go-Round, and Accessible Super Scooper. The Dino Climber, Log Crawl, and fossil dig areas are sure to tempt even the youngest of future archeologists and geologists. There is also the

original playscape for older kids which has been nicely refurbished. Picnicking is made convenient with tables and bathroom facilities. And don't miss the Kindness Rock Garden – created by Girl Scout Troop 77262 – where you can add a rock or take a rock!

**Ghesquiere Park** at City Hall is the place to be for pickleball fanatics, with four courts catering to those seeking camaraderie and competition. Its grassy areas are perfect for the popular summertime Family Movie Nights. Baseball diamonds, a playscape, soccer fields, batting cages, and an ice hockey rink deliver four-season entertainment.

Lake Front Park is a mecca for flora, fitness, and family enthusiasts. The nautical-themed Mini Golf Course features nine handicap-accessible holes enhanced by a lighthouse, buoys, and scorecard stands mimicking dock pilings. Tennis and pickleball courts provide fitness opportunities. Stroll along the boardwalk to take in spectacular Lake St. Clair views or stop in at the Activities Center for games and exercise. Our Aquatic Facility entices with refreshing water in an all-new Splash Pad opening in 2024, a wading pool, Olympic-sized swimming pool, giant dual water slides, lap lanes, and diving pool. Pavilions and gazebos with charcoal grills dot this recreation complex snaked with trails shared with skittering fauna. Along the 1.38-mile walking path are workout stations to keep every part of your body in shape.

Beloved four-legged furry friends can romp carefree in not one but two **Dog Parks**: the original Dog Park at Lake Front Park and now the brand-new one located near City Hall with an entrance at Torrey Rd. and Mack Ave. Admittance is by key fob, available for purchase at the Community Center.

**Sweeney Park** is a hidden jewel within residential streets featuring a playscape and an ice rink in the winter. **Jules DePorre Park** is a cozy pocket park perfect for meditative moments.

Whether you seek flora or fauna, exercise or relaxation, solitude on walking paths, family fun under covered pavilions, or boat wells with access to the Great Lakes and beyond, our acres of city parks offer it all!



#### **City Government**

In accordance with the city charter and code of the city, the municipal judge is an elected official with a four-year term and presides over all court jurisdiction matters (reference city code, chapter 15).

#### The City of Grosse Pointe Woods

Originally incorporated in 1927, Grosse Pointe Woods was known as the Village of Lochmoor. In 1939, the Village of Lochmoor became the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods and on December 11, 1950, it was incorporated as the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, a Home Rule City. The city covers an area of 3.28 square miles.

Grosse Pointe Woods operates under a Council-Administrator form of government, established by the city charter and adopted by voters in 1950. This efficient format divides government into policy-making and administrative functions, and has an organizational structure similar to a business.

The residents of the city are the highest government authority. They delegate this authority to representatives they elect for four-year terms. Similar to a board of directors of a corporation, the city council, composed of the mayor and six council members, is responsible for determining policies and adopting ordinances needed to maintain the health, safety and welfare of the citizens.

Input provided by various advisory boards and commissions is a valuable resource. Citizens show interest in the community not only by voting, but also by taking an active part in the policy-making process. There are 14 boards and commissions established to address specific purposes. Some function in an advisory capacity, making recommendations to the city council; others review problems and petitions from residents, and offer recommendations based upon local regulations and ordinances; several plan and work on special events.

The mayor and city council are particularly proud of commission and board members who serve the city. On numerous occasions, these dedicated citizens have been honored for their allegiance and inestimable contributions to maintaining one of the finest communities in the nation.

#### The Grosse Pointe Woods Foundation

Established in 2008, the Grosse Pointe Woods Foundation is an independent, all-volunteer organization eager to help fund projects to enhance our community for the benefit of residents, visitors, and businesses. Our governance and operations are separate from those of the city and not covered by municipal budget; however we

seek collaborative efforts with City Administration and commissions as well as our local business association to help create and maintain the environment and lifestyle sought by current and prospective residents. Donations are appreciated and are tax deductible; mail a check payable to:



Appointed by and reporting to the mayor and city council, the city administrator is the chief administrative officer of the government. Primarily, the city administrator is responsible for: the efficient administration of all city departments; the enforcement of all city laws and ordinances; the enforcement of contracts or agreements; the recommendation of an annual city budget and its management. The city administrator, in conjunction with the city treasurer/comptroller, maintains a system of accounts which conforms to uniform systems required by law, the city council, and generally accepted principles and procedures of government accounting; and performs other duties as may be prescribed by city charter, city ordinances or city council.

Appointed by and reporting to the city administrator, the city clerk is responsible for:

- voter registration and verification of nominating petitions for local offices or questions;
- administering all elections for the city, state or federal government and school boards as needed, and serving as chair of the election commission;
- training and supervising election inspectors and processing absentee voter requests;
- preparing meeting agendas, posting agendas, recording and preserving the official minutes of the city council and various boards and commissions;
- filing and safeguarding contracts and other legal documents;
- · providing notary services, and issuing business licenses and other permits and licenses;
- serving as the city's freedom of information coordinator and managing the repository of all
  official city records such as ordinances, resolutions, custodian of city seal, and notifications
  regarding public hearings in accordance with the Open Meetings Act;
- · serving as the city's claims administrator.

#### **Voting information**

To be eligible to vote, you must be a U.S. citizen, attained 18 years of age, a resident of the State of Michigan, and registered to vote. You may register to vote at the city clerk's office up to and including Election Day.

#### **Animal licenses**

Any person owning, possessing or harboring a dog, cat or wild animal over the age of four months must obtain a license for that animal from the city clerk. Proof of rabies vaccination is required to obtain the license and tag which must be worn by the animal.

Appointed by and reporting to the city administrator, the city treasurer/comptroller is the chief financial officer of the city. The comptroller works along with the city administrator developing, enacting and overseeing the fiscal policies of the city, and is responsible for budget preparation and review, general ledger accounting and payroll, property/liability/worker's compensation insurance coverage, property tax collections/utility billings/records, accounts payable/receivables, debt financing, pension administration, collection/deposit/investment of all city funds, and fixed asset inventory.

The city treasurer/comptroller assists the city administrator and the finance committee in the preparation of the annual budget. The adopted budget document details the revenue and expenditure estimates of the city for the forthcoming fiscal year (July 1 through June 30). Residents are invited to attend the annual budget hearings held in April and May of each year. The budget document is available to the public, upon request, following its adoption (by city charter on the third Monday in May).

#### **Summer Tax Deferment**

You can delay paying your summer taxes until February 14 if your total household income is \$40,000 or less as shown on your Michigan Homestead property tax return, **and** you can be classified as one of the following:

- eligible service person, eligible veteran, eligible widow or widower as defined in Chapter 9 of the Income Tax Act of 1967 (MCL 206.501 to 206.532)
- blind
- senior citizen (age 62 or older) or un-remarried spouse
- paraplegic, quadriplegic or totally and permanently disabled

Taxpayers may claim a deferment by filing an "application for deferment of summer taxes" form available at City Hall or at www.gpwmi.us. Forms are due by September 15. All taxes paid after February 28 must be paid at the Wayne County treasurer's office.

WCA Assessing is contracted by the city to perform assessing services. A company representative is at City Hall on Mondays from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. The assessing department is responsible for listing all real and personal property in the City of Grosse Pointe Woods. Generally, real property is land and all things attached to it. Personal property is property such as machinery and equipment belonging to a business. Annually, the assessor is required by state law to individually place an assessment equal to 50 percent of its true cash value on all property in the jurisdiction.

Records in the assessor's office, including field sheets, appraisal reports, legal descriptions, 12-month sales data, lot and building sizes, are available to the public. Assessment rolls are completed in February. A formal review is held in March by members of the board of review, a body composed of Grosse Pointe Woods citizens appointed by the city council to review such issues. Any property owner who feels there may be an error in assessment may attend one of the sessions. Property owners must make an appointment to appear before the board by calling (313) 343-2435. Check the city calendar for scheduled hearing dates. Also, the hearing dates are published in the *Grosse Pointe News* as required by law.

#### **Public Safety items to note**

- · Vehicles are not allowed to park on the street between 3 and 5 a.m. unless a permit is obtained.
- Bicycle licenses are required and can be purchased at the department of public safety for \$1.
- Per the city ordinance, cats and dogs are limited to a combination of four per household, and no
  more than three dogs or four cats. All cats and dogs over four months of age are required to be
  licensed and vaccinated annually. Licenses can be purchased at the City Clerk's office with
  proof of vaccination. Dogs must be on a leash when leaving your property and are not allowed in
  the city parks, except with a dog park or boater-dog permit for Lake Front Park.

The municipal court is responsible for the administration of justice under the laws of the State of Michigan and the local ordinances of the city. Jurisdiction includes civil matters up to \$3,000, and criminal misdemeanors occurring within the city.

The court handles the arraignment, setting bail and conducting preliminary examinations in felony cases, as well as traffic offenses, city charter and ordinance violations, and landlord-tenant disputes. The Michigan Supreme Court has directed municipal courts not to accept small claims cases. Litigants may still proceed with their civil claims (up to \$3,000) under the court's general civil division.

The primary responsibility of the building department is the enforcement of construction codes
relating to building, electrical, plumbing and mechanical work including new construction,
additions, alterations, renovations, demolitions, swimming pools, sheds, fencing and other
related activities. McKenna, a full-service community planning, design, and building services firm
headquartered in Northville, MI, holds the contract from Grosse Pointe Woods to manage the
city's Building Department.

Permits must be secured for the following types of work:

- · installation of fences, swimming pools, sidewalks, driveways, porches, sewers, decks;
- · major electrical, plumbing, heating, cooling and mechanical installations;
- · additions and alterations to homes and accessory buildings, re-roofing;
- · aluminum or vinyl siding installation;
- · rebuilding of masonry chimneys or fireplaces;
- · temporary signs, business signs and awnings.

Note: This list is not all inclusive. Please call the building department if you have questions.

Alterations to commercial structures require a review before the planning commission. Guidelines for this procedure may be obtained from the building department office.

Whenever there is a change of ownership of a home or business, or new residential construction, a Certificate of Occupancy inspection is required. Rental properties require a certificate of approval and must be registered with the building department. Upon the change of tenants, the property owner or agent has 30 days to register new tenants with the building department.

#### **Code Enforcement**

#### **Common Code Violations**

- If the owner of any parcel of property within the city fails or neglects to cut the weeds, brush
  or grass growing upon the property and the weeds, brush and grass attains the height of
  six inches or more, the city after 48 hours of notice, shall have the authority to and may
  enter upon the property, or hire a private contractor to enter upon the property to abate the
  nuisance. Costs incurred by the city plus a 30-percent administrative fee shall be billed to
  the owner.
- Yard maintenance standards include the plant material in any right-of-way abutting the
  property. On a corner lot, no fences, walls, hedges or planting shall be erected or maintained
  to a height exceeding thirty (30) inches above the crown of the roadway within fifteen (15)
  feet of the intersection of the front and side street property lines. Vegetation and trees must
  be trimmed so as not to impair vision or obstruct the travel of motorists or pedestrians.
- Inoperative motor vehicles cannot be stored except in a fully enclosed structure that was constructed with a permit.

- Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard and must be disposed of properly.
- Parking is permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles in residential lots only on a legal driveway or in a garage.
- Commercial equipment and commercial vehicles may not be parked or stored in a residential area unless they are within a fully enclosed structure.
- All exterior building structures and walls shall be maintained in a secure and attractive manner. All defective structural and decorative elements of such building facade(s) shall be repaired or replaced in a competent manner, to match as closely as possible the original materials and construction of the building.
- The maintenance of a structure is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows and screens, and other exterior parts of a structure must be maintained in weather tight, rodent proof, sound condition and good repair. The property owner is responsible for maintaining secure windows, doors or other openings that cannot be readily opened from the outside.
- Outdoor storage is prohibited. Any equipment, materials or furnishings that would ordinarily not be used outdoors may not be stored outdoors.

 In residential areas, storage of boats, mobile homes, campers, recreational vehicles, and boat/travel/house/non-commercial utility trailers are permitted only if such vehicles or equipment are unoccupied and parked in a fully enclosed garage, or if permitted with a 72-hour pass by the Department of Public Safety per Ordinance Section 50-208(8).

Public works is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and is responsible for maintaining all city buildings and grounds. Public works operates on an eight-year rotating schedule and is responsible for maintenance and capital improvements including water system repairs, tree trimming, replacement of street signs, concrete sidewalk and approach, and miscellaneous street repair, asphalt street resurfacing, maintenance of the sewer system and fire hydrants. City employees inspect driveway approaches and sidewalks, and handle care of grass, flowers and sprinkling systems on city property.

#### Rubbish & yard waste removal

All rubbish, recycling, yard waste and brush is to be set out for collection no later than 7 a.m. on the day scheduled for collection and no earlier than 5 p.m. the day before scheduled collection. Rubbish and food waste must be in plastic bags and placed in the 64-gallon brown cart stamped "Waste Only" provided by GFL. Construction materials, concrete or car parts will not be picked up. Contractors, owners or tenants are responsible for disposal of these items outside of the city.

#### Yard waste

- Acceptable items are grass clippings, leaves, twigs, fruit, garden and hedge clippings, and house and garden plants with soil removed.
- Suitable containers are paper yard waste bags or 32-35 gallon containers labeled "yard waste" or "compost."
- Bags and containers may not exceed 50 lbs.
- Compost stickers for containers are available for no charge at the DPW and City Hall during normal business hours.
- Paper yard waste bags are available \$4.50 for 10 bags – at the DPW and City Hall during normal business hours, or at the Public Safety department when they are closed.

#### **Chipping Service**

- Brush and branches must be no more than 4" in diameter, at least 4' in length and no more than 12'.
- Stack brush neatly at the curb with cut ends facing the street. DO NOT bundle.
- Long pieces should be placed on a diagonal so as not to cover sidewalks.
- · DPW will not chip tree removals.

#### Bundled brush, branches and wood

 Brush, branches and wood must be no more than 4" in diameter and cut to measure NO MORE than 4' in length.

WEDNESDAY

THURSDAY

- Bundled brush and tree trimmings must be tied with twine.
- Bundles tied with twine must not exceed 50 lbs. or 18" in diameter.
- Wood must meet the same size requirements as bundled brush and must have any nails bent over or removed to prevent injury.

### Sod, soil, dirt, tree stumps, plant containers, or garbage of any kind will not be picked up.


There is limited curbside pickup of yard waste from December 18, 2023, through March 14, 2024, due to the minimal amount during these months. However, residents may bring bags to the public works yard for disposal. Residents must stop in the office to show proof of residence.

#### Heavy household items

Appliances, furniture, and other oversized items are collected on your regular pick-up day. Call public works 48 hours in advance to advise of pickup. If you have extra rubbish due to a move, please arrange for a dumpster rental or call DPW for more information.

#### Leaf disposal

From October 7 through Nov. 28, 2024, leaves may *only* be raked into the gutter for vacuuming on your collection day. Leaves are collected as shown on the map at right. In order to keep up with the volume of falling leaves, there is a possibility of additional leaf pickups on unscheduled streets. This does not affect the regular pickup schedule. Leaves cannot be vacuumed from beneath parked cars, so avoid parking on the street at collection time. Do not mix other garden waste with leaves because it can damage the equipment. Mixed piles will not be picked up.



Curbside pickup of bagged leaves and other yard waste is available until December 12. From December 16, 2024, through March 13, 2025, residents may bring bags to public works yard for disposal. Residents must stop in the office to show proof of residency.

#### Recycling

Each residence is provided with a 64-gallon green cart stamped "Recycling Only." Items that can be recycled include: newspapers, magazines, catalogues, office paper and telephone books, clean and flattened cardboard and cereal boxes, junk mail; all metal or aluminum cans and containers including trays, foil and pie tins, rinsed and flattened if possible; empty aerosol cans, plastic caps discarded; glass bottles and jars, rinsed and unbroken, with metal lids removed and recycled. When recycle cart is full, place at the curb next to your trash.

The following items are *not* recyclable and should be disposed of as follows: plastic bags, broken glass, incandescent light bulbs, mirrors, Pyrex, ceramic dishes, styrofoam, and empty motor oil containers should be put in regular rubbish bags. Fluorescent bulbs contain a small amount of mercury and can be dropped off at the DPW on Hazardous Waste Drop-off days in April and October. Used motor oil, antifreeze, and car or boat batteries can be dropped off at the DPW during normal business hours. Household batteries are considered hazardous waste and can be dropped off during normal business hours at the Community Center, the DPW, or the public safety department.

#### **Forestry**

The forestry division is responsible for the maintenance of trees, shrubs, flowers and grass throughout the city and parks. Trees are trimmed every eight years according to the district maintenance schedule. Residents who want to plant these same trees on private property can obtain a complete list of acceptable trees by calling (313) 343-2460. DTE is responsible for pruning trees encroaching on their easement. If you have questions, call them at 1-800-477-4747. Public works can supply a list of trees suitable for planting under electrical wires. DTE is responsible for maintaining all streetlights. Report street light outages to public works or directly to DTE at 1-800-477-4747.

#### Snow removal

When a snowfall begins, crews start salting and snow removal immediately on major streets and school areas, followed by residential streets. Sidewalks are plowed only when there are at least four inches of frost in the ground and two or more inches of snow. Residents are responsible for clearing snowfall of less than two inches. Sod or sprinkler systems damaged by city plows should be reported to public works. Repairs are made in the spring. **The city does not reimburse residents for repairs made by private contractors.** Salt is available to residents at public works on weekdays, 8 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Bring your own shovel and container.

#### Admission to parks

Entry to the parks is by resident park pass only (passes valid January 1, 2023 - December 31, 2025). Completed applications are accepted at the Community Center and usually can be processed on the spot. Children under 8 years of age do not need a park pass. Changes in residency will result in park pass cancellation.

#### Park pass procedures

The Community Center processes park passes every three years, at which time residents will be required to have a new photo taken. Park passes for 2023-2025 are available for each resident, eight years and older, and must be obtained at the Community Center in order to gain entry to any of the city parks. New residents must show proof of residency, including those who have moved to another Grosse Pointe Woods address, anyone newly added to the list, and any non-head-of-household 21 years or older.

#### **Guests privileges**

Park passes no longer include guest punches. All pass-holding residents under 18 years of age may bring in one guest per day into Lake Front Park; residents 18 and over are allowed two guests per day. Lost park passes can be replaced through adult application for a \$20 fee. Stolen passes may be replaced free of charge if a police report is provided. Damaged passes may be turned in at the Community Center for a new pass free of charge.

#### Rentals and special passes

Pavilion and gazebo rentals allow for 25 non-resident guests. Reservations can not be made for Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, or city-observed events. For a complete list of guidelines, refer to the application available at the Community Center.

Special visitor passes for Lake Front Park are issued for out-of-town guests coming 100 miles or more and staying for an extended period (\$10 each; valid for six weeks).

A caregiver permit (\$10) may be issued to a household and used by any non-resident caregiver only when accompanied by the child requiring caregiver services.






