MINUTES OF THE REGULAR SENIOR CITIZENS' COMMISSION MEETING OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS HELD ON WEDNESDAY, May 17, 2017 IN THE PARK ROOM OF THE COMMUNITY CENTER, 20025 MACK PLAZA DRIVE, GROSSE POINTE WOODS, MI 48236

CALL TO ORDER: Don Witt, Co-Chair/GCR called the meeting to order at 4:03 p.m.

ROLL CALL:

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

No minutes were kept from the meeting held on Tuesday, March 21, 2017 in the absence of a quorum. Approval of the minutes from the meeting held on Tuesday, January 17, 2017 will be discussed at the Commission's next scheduled meeting in July.

CHAIRPERSON REPORT:

Co-chair/GCR, Witt thanked the commission for their work at the Ice Cream Social Event. Overall, it was an excellent event and the Grosse Pointe North High School Jazz Band was well-received. Due to unplanned construction of the Grosse Pointe Woods Community Center's driveway, 31 individuals did not attend the event.

Heartland Grosse Pointe Sponsorship inquiry will be discussed at the Commission's next scheduled meeting in July.

Witt reported attending presentation by A.H. Peters at Blossom Heath and found information valuable to the population we serve. Discussion continued resulted with the conclusion being that in order to prevent the appearance of endorsing a private business, it may be best to plan a forum which includes all the funeral homes located in Grosse Pointe Woods. A.H. Peters Seminar and/or Forum will be discusses that the Commission's next scheduled meeting in July.

Witt reported rescind of prospective Commissioners, Kyle Thornton and Carol Piper and the resignation of Anne Marie Gattari.

Communication improvements will be discussed at the Commission's next scheduled meeting in July.

COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVE REPORT:

McConaghy reported the City budget was approved on Monday, May 15th. An upcoming Bond will be issued for municipal improvements and renovations on City Hall.

COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVE REPORT:

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Wehrmann reported the Carry-Forward Budget Balance as of March 1, 2017 is \$6,111.47. The council-Approved General Fund carries a balance of \$2,229.43.

S.O.C. REPORT:

Uhlig-Johnstone reported that S.O.C will be holding three Town Hall Meetings, on May 31st, June 2nd, and June 6th, to explore what our community needs to meet the needs of the aging population as well as caregivers. NEW BUSINESS:

Witt indicated there are currently three vacancies on the Senior Citizens Commission. McConaghy informed the Commission to proceed in fulfilling the three vacancies.

Wehrmann confirmed date of the 2017 Senior Picnic of Saturday, September 9, 2017. A brief discussion was held regarding the possibility of using a tent in case of overflow. Witt suggested that the committee be of assistance to Norris in transporting items needed for the picnic to and from the Lake Front Park.

Witt requested an update from the brochure subcommittee. Subcommittee members were not present to provide a report. Brochure subcommittee will be discussed at the Commission's next scheduled meeting in July.

Motion by Wehrmann, seconded by Thornton, to adjourn the meeting at 5:00 pm. Said motion passed unanimously.

Senior Assessment Services

Program Goals

- To enhance quality of life for patients suffering from dementia and functional decline, and to coordinate appropriate resources directed at this segment of our population
- Provide access to interdisciplinary specialists, and community resources in collaboration with the primary care provider
- Develop a plan of care for the patient that will include recommendations for bio-psychosocial interventions
- Enhance communication and coordination of care while maintaining patient specific needs

Operations

- Comprehensive services provided in one location
- 2 Centers: One located on Providence-Providence Park Hospital, Novi Campus in Medical Office Building, Suite 205, and the other located at 648 St. Clair in Grosse Pointe.
- Referrals from primary care physicians, specialists, and direct referrals from patient and caregivers

Staffing Model

- A multidisciplinary team of a geriatric nurse practitioner, social worker, pharmacist, physical therapist and office clerk under the supervision of a neurologist

Summary of Services

- Designed to supplement services provided by primary care
- Assessment of suspected cognitive impairment
- Assessment of falls/balance risk
- Patient and caregiver education
- Recommendations for other therapies that may improve functioning of the patient (i.e., physical therapy, sleep studies, occupational therapy, speech therapy, capacity for independent driving, etc.)
- Pharmacologic screen
- Nutritional screen
- Advanced directives and palliative care
- Summary evaluation to primary care physician within 7 days of assessment
- Independent driving simulator



Desired Outcomes

- Improve the health, function and quality of life for older adults
- Diagnose Alzheimer's disease, and other dementias
- Stabilize or slow cognitive decline; stabilize or prevent additional functional disability
- Decrease the severity or delay emergence of behavioral symptoms
- Reduce acute events, visits to the ER, readmission rates & admission to nursing homes

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Senior Assessments



Ascension



Senior assessments offered by St. John Providence are designed to enhance the quality of life for older adults experiencing functional and physical changes related to aging. The goal is to understand each patient's specific needs by providing:

- Assessment of cognitive and physical status
- Quality of life enhancement for people living with dementia and functional decline
- Access to specialists
- Appropriate community resources identification in collaboration with the primary care provider
- A recommended plan of care for the patient
- Coordination of care for patient-specific needs with the primary care provider

Convenience and ease of access

This type of an assessment could be time consuming and a challenge for primary care doctors. However, the center coordinates a one-time, one-location visit for the patient which may require up to four hours of time. The convenience, ease of access and cohesive recommended plan removes the challenges for both the patient and the physician.

Our staffing model

The assessment center uses a multidisciplinary team approach of a geriatric nurse practitioner, social worker, pharmacist, physical therapist and a medical assistant under the supervision of a neurologist.

Desired outcomes

The assessments of each our patients will result in a plan of care that will lead to desired outcomes. Those outcomes include:

- Improved health, function and quality of life for older adults
- Assess Alzheimer's disease, and other dementias
- Maintain or slow cognitive decline; maintain or slow additional functional disability
- Decrease the severity or delay emergence of behavioral symptoms
- Reduce acute events and visits to the ER
- Resources for caregivers



Summary of services

Dependent on each patient's need, and designed to supplement the services provided by the primary care physician, the visit may include:

- Assessment and testing of suspected cognitive impairment
- Assessment of balance, gait and risk for falls
- Patient and caregiver education
- Recommendations for other therapies that may improve functioning of the patient, i.e., Physical therapy, sleep studies, occupational therapy, speech therapy, capacity for independent driving, etc.
- Medication assessment
- Nutritional assessment
- Advanced directives and palliative care
- Community resources
- Summary recommendation to primary care physician within seven days of assessment
- Independent driving simulator (may require a second visit for this assessment and is not covered by insurance).
